Sociology of First Peoples

This course is an introduction to the key issues surrounding Canada's First Peoples, with particular attention paid to the ongoing efforts to overcome and transcend the consequences of the country's colonial history. As a basis for understanding the current situations facing Canada's First Nations, the first part of the course will review the history of first contact, and continue to examine the various treaties and later, policies which have proven so deleteriously consequential to the culture and well-being of so many of the country's First Peoples.

The course's emphasis on history will be balanced by consideration of First Nation, Métis and Inuit contemporary challenges with issues of identity, city life and gender relations, land title and ownership, self-determination and self-government. The course will conclude with a consideration of Canadian Aboriginal Peoples within a more global context.

Texts

There are two required texts for this course:

Olive Patricia Dickason with William Newbigging, *A Concise History of Canada's First Nations*, 2nd Ed. (Toronto: Oxford University Press, 2010).

James S. Frideres, René R. Gadacz, *Aboriginal Peoples in Canada*, 9th Ed. (Toronto: Pearson, 2012).

Portions of both books will be assigned together on a regular basis. Both books will be available in the university book store. Used copies of these books may be available. Feel free to use these if you have access to them, but check that they are the current editions. Additional material will be made available on reserve in the library.

Evaluation

The course grade will be based on a series of progressively weighted written exercises distributed over the course of the term which are designed to promote the critical analysis of various forms of culturally available information,

conceptions and representations of first contact, colonialism, and post-colonial developments.
