The junior seminar is a three-credit course offered for honours Sociology students, normally in their 3rd year. In this course, you will be provided with an orientation to writing a thesis, selecting an advisor, and using research tools such as RefWorks. You will be assigned a reading written by each Sociology faculty member, and meet with them to discuss their thoughts on doing sociologically informed research. You will meet them in their office (their office number is provided below). You will also shadow the 4th year students to observe the steps taken in completing a thesis project. You will learn that the research process is adaptable to reflect the various approaches, theories, and methodologies in the discipline.

Evaluation

Your grade is based on the following work.

40% Journal of reflections

Keep a journal to document your reflections on what you are learning about the thesis process and about doing Sociological research. You are encouraged to write a reflection for each week, but your grade will be based on the following:

- your critical reflections (not summaries) of the readings written by each faculty members and the discussion with each faculty member about their research
- a reflection based on your review of 3-4 Sociology honours thesis (in Carla's office)
- your critical reflections on the Honours Thesis Presentations
- your thoughts on the St.F.X. Student Research Day.

Each reflection should be about 150-200 words. They are due Fridays by 4:00 (in my mailbox) the week it was assigned. They will be returned the following class. **Please** submit all your reflections in a duotang on March 27th.

Please note that the readings written by the Sociology faculty will be delivered by email attachment (as a PDF of a published article or a manuscript being developed).

40% Essay [due Feb 20]

Writing a paper on a topic related to your thesis under the supervision of a Sociology faculty member. You are strongly encouraged to write about some aspect of the topic you might study for your thesis.

20% Planning and participating in a Sociology Forum.

The class will organize a Sociology Forum, and each student will present a research paper at this forum. You may also request one or two faculty members to present a paper. The paper you choose to present may be the one written for this course or a paper you prepared for another course. It is recommended that some aspect of the paper presented could be used for your thesis (e.g., theoretical concept, literature review). The length of the presentation will be 10-15 minutes. Options for this public forum will be discussed in class. The Sociology Forum will be in the winter term. The date will be set by January 23 to allow students to plan.

Honours students are entitled to use the **student resource room**, **Annex 8B**. You can arrange to get a room key (and possibly a locker) by meeting with Carla Haley-Baxter.
