WELCOME THE CLASS



- Introduce yourself through a blog or video.
 - Highlight your interests and passion for the class
 - Share what you are excited and/or nervous about
 - Model what you would like students to do
- Ask students to share about themselves in word or video

BE VISIBLE

- Include a picture or avatar (Moodle, Collaborate, etc.)
- Frequent announcements – weekly
- Provide virtual office hours – synchronously online and on email
 - we don't have to be available per week
 - respond to these questions/conversations in 'real' time
- Participate with students in ice breaker activities – model the way
- Recognize we may have to build connections with our students online even if we had established relationships face-to-face



BE HONEST

- Building community involves connecting regarding common interests as well as the course
- Create an open and safe environment where there is mutual trust
- Pay attention when students introduce themselves
 - find ways to respond to who they are, their interests
- Share that teaching and learning remotely may be a learning experience for all involved
 - focus on learning together and from one another



BE PUNCTUAL

- Start class, office hours, meetings, etc on time
- End class, office hours, meetings, etc as scheduled
- Provide clear communication of turnaround times regarding grading of assignments, midterms, and exams
- Share the format in which feedback will be given, including rubrics where applicable



INVOLVE STUDENTS



- Use a 'snowball' where everybody responds to a question in the chat box at the same time (give question, one minute to respond, then 3-2-1, send)
 - at the opening of class – questions about previous class; what you learned last class/what sticks out the most
 - at the end of class – share what you learned/questions you still have
- Gather feedback from students about how the class is going- use a snowball as above- use polling/survey questions

SIGNING OFF

- Use a common and personal, easy way to end your class es, virtual office hours, etc.
 - so it is clear class has finished
 - and it provides a close
- e.g. 3,2,1 goodbye and wave (tell students to un-mute – so they can say it too)
- Remain online for questions regarding the class for students as needed
